

I had nearly finished mocking up this issue when I received an email from our President, Gary Phillips, announcing the death of a well-respected journalist, editor, novelist, and from all accounts, wonderful human being—Gary Amo. Since that email, I have learned much about the man, albeit too late.

Gary enjoyed a long career at Palos Verdes Peninsula News as a reporter, political editor and managing editor during the 90s. Before that, he did stints in the Peace Corps in Malawi, as an English instructor in Ethiopia, as a creative director for an ad agency, as editor of The Firing Line, and as a tank commander for the United States Marine Corps Reserve.

He made his presence felt in our little corner of the world as both an accomplished mystery author and as past MWA SoCal President. His novel *Come Nightfall* was nominated for an Edgar in 1991. Later, under the pen name Garrison Allen, he wrote cozies featuring a feline protagonist, including *Baseball Cat*, *Desert Cat*, and *Movie Cat*.

As if that weren't enough, Gary somehow shoehorned into his full life the time to become a ranked sharp-shooter in high-power rifle competition.

Our own Susan Goldstein told me, "Gary was an amazing man and incredibly supportive to me when I first dreamed of writing a murder mystery."

His dear friend, Sunshine, explained Gary's response to critics of his editorials: "You get a balanced report on the front page. If you do not like what is on the editorial page, publish your own newspaper."

The obituary that ran on July 26, 2012 in the Palos Verdes Peninsula News was filled with heartfelt quotes from people with whom Gary worked, and on whose lives he made a lasting impression.

I am sorry I will never know you, Gary Amo. Rest in peace.
